Nicholas County Schools is a small, rural district located in Carlisle, Kentucky. The Nicholas County School System is composed of Nicholas County Elementary School (Grades Pre K-6), Nicholas County High School (Grades 7-12), and a Family Resource/Youth Service Center. All schools, offices, bus facilities, athletic facilities, labs, and mobile units are located on one campus. Recent construction allowed grades 7 and 8 to be moved from the elementary school and into a new middle school wing attached to the high school.

Enrollment (Pre-K through 12th grade) is approximately 1250 students. Nearly 70% of our students qualify for free or reduced lunch. The student population is primarily caucasion, with less than 5% belonging to minority groups.

The staff of the Nicholas County school district is comprised of a relatively equal number of residents of the county along with those living in other communities.

The data indicates that our students perform at or near the state profiency level in early elementary reading; however the distance we move away from that average becomes greater in the middle and high school grades. Math is another area of weakness for our district. The gaps are indentified in both of these areas for free and reduced lunch and between males and females. Math scores dropped due to the gap between Kentucky Core Content 4.1 and the new Kentucky Academic Core Standards.

Areas of Strengths

Fourth grade science had a student index of 100. This is the first content area our district has had to reach that level. Middle school science was also an area of strength, with a score within three points of the state average. Middle school social studies and writing scores were also very near the state average, with social studies only 0.3 from that mark, and writing within 1.5.

Opportunities for Improvement

Improvement is needed in many areas. However, an emphasis must be placed on district-wide reading performance and math performance. With reading affecting students' ability to achieve in all other content areas, improvement there should lead to improvement in other areas as well. More focus on professional development in both of these two subjects, as well as additional assistance to low achieving students are planned to make needed improvements.

Regular student assessments and data analysis of the results will drive teacher instruction. Weekly review of lesson plans and regular walk through observations will keep administrators involved in improving instruction.
