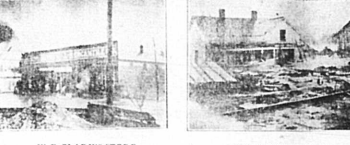


FLOOD SCENES AT PARKS FERRY

Hundreds of stacks of corn and fodder in fields lying near the river were swept away.

The water was partly over the bridge at Parks Ferry, and for a time, it was feared that the structure would be carried away.

Rail mail carriers experienced much difficulty in making their route, and in case of two trains, they were forced to turn back.
