CONGRESS APPROPRIATES A QUARTER MILLION DOLLARS FOR HORSE BREEDING.

Money To Be Spent Under Supervision of Army Officers To Raise More Thoroughbred Horses for Cavalry Purposes.

OTHER GOVERNMENTS SPEND MUCH MORE.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 25.—The House of Representatives today appropriated \$250,000 for the purpose of raising more thoroughbred horses for the cavalry. The appropriation is for the fiscal year 1921.

The bill, which was introduced by Representative James H. Doolittle of Michigan, provides that the money shall be used to purchase and maintain breeding stock, to pay the expenses of the breeders, and to pay the expenses of the government in the raising of the horses.

The bill also provides that the government shall have the right to purchase any of the horses raised under the program, and that the government shall have the right to use any of the horses for the cavalry.

The bill is expected to pass the House in the near future, and it is expected that the Senate will also pass it.

137,000 POUNDS TOBACCO PLEDGED AT FIRST MEETING

Mr. Joseph P. Morrison, president of the Carlsle Tobacco Growers' Association, today announced that the association had pledged 137,000 pounds of tobacco to the government for the purpose of raising revenue.
