LAND REQUIRES LEGUME CROPS

Proper maintenance of fields requires a legume crop at least once in four years, according to a report of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station on the best soil and crops.

"While lime and fertilizers are necessary to the growing of clover, and greatly increase the growth of soybeans and soybeans, and other crops to some extent," says the report, "such cannot be brought to a high state of productivity without either turning under the legume crops or returning the manure made by feeding them and other crops."

"The cropping system should have a legume crop on each field at least once in four years. 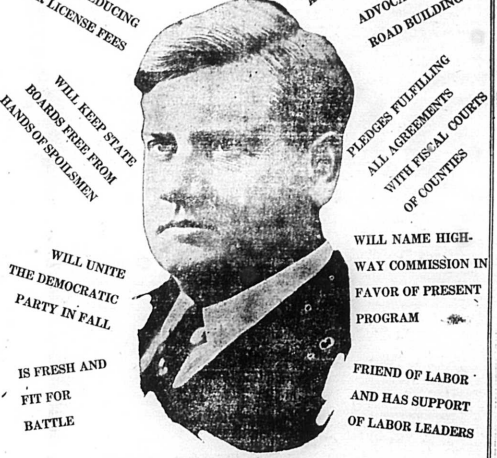

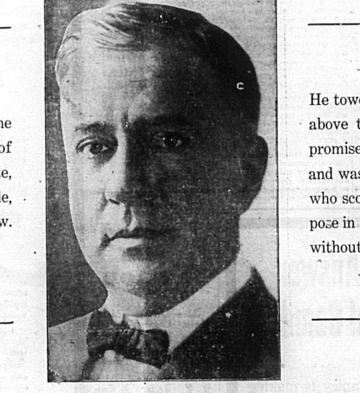

He knows, as every thinking man in Kentucky knows, that the Governor of Kentucky never did and, in all the ages to come never will reduce a penny of taxes, since it is not given to the Chief Executive to perform an act of this kind. In all of the confines of the Commonwealth there could not be found a man of any political faith who possessed the necessary ability for the discharge of the duties of the high office, who would seek or accept it if forced to perform the duties of the legislative branch.

His administration is the one outstanding record of achievement in Kentucky. His performance outdone promises, and if returned to Frank-

fort he will have no other purpose than to do what he conceives to be the best possible thing for the State and her people. He did not consult with friends to learn if they would support his candidacy. It was the other way round.
