

To The Citizenship of Kentucky:

Our State has definitely before it the vitally important project of acquiring the Mammoth Cave area and converting it into a National Park.

The Federal Government has sanctioned the acceptance of 70,618 acres of surface lands and underground marvels in the heart of Kentucky, including Mammoth Cave and twenty-five other caverns. The government will develop and improve this area on a vast scale, and will perpetually maintain it, but will not appropriate money for the purchase of these privately owned lands.

Two and a half million dollars is the cost. Congress has designated the Mammoth Cave National Park Association as the agency through which the money is to be secured. The Association realizes fully that the fund can be obtained only through the gifts of the business institutions and people of the state. Accordingly the money must come through public subscription.

Eminent Kentuckians in the ten regions of the state are leading regional activities in the solicitation of funds. The drive will begin Monday, December 5, and intensively continue until the fund is assured.

The press, the pulpit, civic and commercial bodies, the school system of the state and numerous other agencies will assist in disseminating information concerning the effort, and in arousing interest in its behalf.

They appreciate that the forces necessary to insure complete success must mobilize; thinking people of the state must respond.

Kentucky's National Park will mean an increase of half a million tourist visitors to the state annually. It will bring one hundred million dollars a year in tourist spendings.

It will be an important factor in the development of good roads throughout the state, and in other valuable improvements. The benefits will reach every community.

Kentucky needs her fair share of the \$3,000,000,000 American tourists are spending every year for outdoor recreation.

Here is a definite opportunity for a greater Kentucky.

In creating Mammoth Cave National Park as a gift for the Nation, Kentucky will create a tremendous benefit for the state, and for every individual in the state.

The cause needs the unreserved support of every loyal and sincere Kentuckian.

The call for service has come. The call for contributions is here. You are asked to give liberally of your time and of your money.

Kentucky, upon her honor, must do this thing. Her pride of tradition and achievement will not let her fail. The hour for action has arrived.

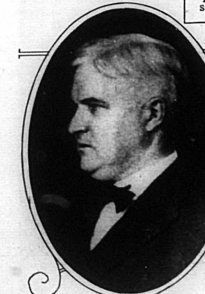
