Business Men Want the Combined Bridge. They See In It the Key to the Maysville-Aberdeen Gateway

The future of Maysville and the country from Paris, Ky., to Dayton, O., depends on a north and south railway across the Ohio from Maysville to Aberdeen.

Vests to a dozen Ohio and Kentucky towns in the line of our proposed north and south mainline railway disclose strong demands among business men for the combination bridge across the Ohio river from Maysville to Aberdeen.

But who would build the road? We don't know. Probably an existing railroad which could most naturally connect up with this bridge and thus become one of the most prosperous mainlines in the country.

That is about the history of American railroad building.

What we are proposing to do is this: equip the bridge for vehicular traffic and also for railway connections. The bridge would at once come into use for vehicles, then it would stand as a practical, if not irresistible, invitation to some company to connect up with it and complete this north and south mainline.

We already have forty miles of such a line in the L. & N. from Maysville to Paris. The bridge would add another mile. That would have eighty-seven miles to be built to Dayton.

What is more natural than to suppose that the L. & N. would connect up with the bridge at Maysville? Consider what that would mean to this Paris-Maysville branch of the L. & N. It would practically reestablish it, it would be like breathing new life into a dying body. Everybody knows that.

That would literally MAKE this whole country from Dayton down to south and east Kentucky. This north and south mainline would become one of the big coal-carrying roads of this country, to say nothing of traffic of other kinds.

Much of the Kentucky coal is now shipped far out of its way around Cincinnati simply because there is no such north and south line as we are proposing.

Where does Henry Ford get his coal? Probably most of it from these mines. Do you realize that this proposed north and south mainline would cross or connect with fourteen other railroads in Kentucky and Ohio, including Mr. Ford's Detroit, Toledo & Ironmont? Do you realize what that would mean?

We do not propose to complete the railway part of this combination bridge at once. We will complete the vehicular traffic and foot passage parts and will construct the bridge so as to sustain the weight of a standard railway when it is laid. The engineers have fully prepared for that. Of course, we would have to get a certificate of necessity from the Interstate Commerce Commission before completing the railroad part of it.

When this bridge is built and the mainline from Paris to Dayton gets under headway the next and most natural development would be hooking up the great Licking alley with this railroad and section.

A vehicular bridge only would be a nice thing to have. Most certainly it would be a paying investment, but at best it would be but a temporary expedient as against the combination bridge, the key to the Maysville-Aberdeen Gateway, opening up to permanent and unbounded development and prosperity this whole section of Kentucky and Ohio. And besides the combination bridge would give you all that an exclusively vehicular bridge could offer. IT WOULD BE A GREAT PERMANENT PUBLIC SERVICE.

Another bill has been introduced in Congress providing for a vehicular bridge only. Some proponents of that plan suggest that both bills be passed. That would, of course, serve to defeat the whole purpose of providing for a combination bridge. For it is evident to all that the two proposals could probably not be financed.
