## KENTUCKY

The Midway school was closed last week on account of fever.

Five persons were indicted for the Fayette county grand jury Monday.

Adrian T. Ross, 83 years old, Confederate veteran, died at his home in Crickland Sunday.

\$150,000,000 will be spent by the U. S. and Railroad Company for improvements during 1933.

Russell Overley, 71, a deaf mute, was struck and killed by a passenger train at Richmond Sunday.

The city of Richmond has awarded a contract for the construction of a \$60,000 sewage disposal plant.

With about fifty cases of measles the lower grades of the Georgetown city schools have been closed.

When M. A. Wicker, of Barren county, went to feed a horse last week, the animal bit off one of his ears.

Mrs. J. Campbell Cantrell was unanimously re-elected as State Librarian at the session of the legislature last week.

Miss Lillian Vincent, Millersburg, died recently, celebrating her sixtieth birthday anniversary last week. She is in the splendid health.

Governor Sargent last week appointed James G. Venable, police judge of Crickland to succeed the late James W. Cannon.

Members of the Kentucky House of Reform at Greenbush were paroled by the state board of pardons and corrections last week.

Michael Messer, 6 years old, was killed last week when he was run over by a motor car on the main line of the Louisville and Nashville railroad.

Daniel Brown, 41, Mayfield, was seriously injured last Thursday when he stepped from a railroad track directly into the wheels of another train.

After shooting his wife three times in the back, she was fatally wounded, it is believed.

Dr. J. B. Arnes, of Pulaski county, was seriously injured and his life was in danger Sunday morning when they were automobile plunged over a steep embankment.

The bill sponsored by the Louisville Automobile Club, which would place a license on all drivers of automobiles, was killed in the House at Frankfort Monday.

Uncle Irving Everlove, was arrested last week for preaching regularly in Perry county for 72 years and still preaching.

Reed Fox, 79 years old, accused with Soles Hardman in connection with the death of John Rankin at Winchester several years ago, died last week in Detroit, Mich.

Russell Dymk, of Lexington, has been fined \$1000 damages for the death of a child, charged against the J. C. Penney Company, of Highland, for alleged carelessness on a charge of issuing a cold check.

Diamonds and jewelry valued at \$5000 were stolen from the home of Frank G. Brewer in Louisville last week. A reward of \$1000 has been offered for recovery of the loot.

Former Senator O. A. Stanley, in an interview last week, declared Governor Smith and Senator Bledsoe are outstanding candidates for the Democratic nomination for President.

James H. Brown, serving a one year term in the Frankfort penitentiary for burglary, was sentenced to life imprisonment by a jury in the Frankfort circuit court last week for the murder of George Yynn, a workman at the saw factory inside the prison, when he attempted a successful attempt to escape.
