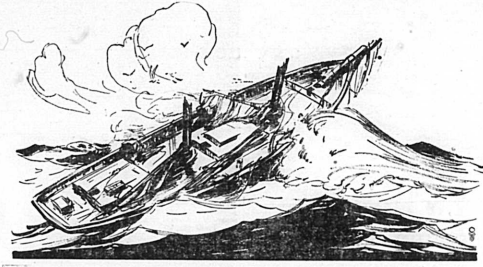

FINAL SETTLEMENT IN HARVEY ESTATE

Special Commissioner Hughes Establishes Fifty-Nine Heirs-At-Law

ALL ARE FAR REMOVED

At the recent term of the Nicholas circuit court the report of Lewis B. Hughes, special commissioner appointed to take proof in the estate of the late John Harvey, was accepted by the court and judgment was rendered by Judge Dismas deciding the case in favor of 59 collateral heirs and 20 collateral heirs. The names of approximately 120 other heirs were rejected because their relationship was either too remote or they were not well enough established. The fifty-nine heirs in the estate reside in Queensland Australia, County Clear, Indiana, Pennsylvania, New York, Massachusetts, Florida, Alabama, California, Texas, Illinois and Kentucky.

The two heirs in Kentucky are Mrs. Mary J. Cline, Harpeth, Moore and Mrs. William C. Cline, both of whom were remotely related to Mr. Harvey's mother's maiden name as McDowell.

Mr. Harvey's first wife was Mrs. Elizabeth C. Harvey, nee Miller, a first cousin, to one of the deceased's seven children, namely Samuel Holmes. Carlisle John J. Deary, New York City, and William and Patrick, Central City, were also heirs in the estate.

John Harvey died at approximately \$110,000 and without issue. His only son was the only son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Harvey, who came to the United States from County Clear, Ireland, about seventy years ago.

After a few years in America, Mr. and Mrs. Harvey had three children in Ireland, and at the time of Mr. Harvey's death he was single. He had no other family in Ireland, and only one other relative in Kentucky, who was also single.

John Harvey was appointed administrator of the estate. Shortly after publication of newspaper articles concerning the estate, Harvey was filed by persons throughout the United States desiring to be related to the heirs of Mr. Harvey.

The report for the lawful heirs to the estate has furnished some very interesting information. A few years ago he had two sons and two daughters, and one of his sons died in infancy. The latter and one other were drowned at sea during a storm. One daughter and her remaining brother and sister reached Australia, where they subsequently married and reared families.

FIRE DESTROYS OLD CAPITOL BUILDING

Historic Structure At Frankfort Burned Saturday Morning With All Contents

\$250,000 LOSS ESTIMATE

The Old State Capitol building at Frankfort was destroyed by fire of unknown origin shortly after 11 o'clock Saturday morning. The contents of the building, including valuable records and documents which cannot be replaced, and the records and papers of the State Highway Commission and the Kentucky Geological Survey, both of which were housed in the building, also were destroyed. The building was owned by the State and was valued at \$250,000.

The building was gutted by the flames and only the walls of the old building, long a point of interest to tourists, were left standing.

The building was a mass of flames when the alarm was sounded, and efforts of Frankfort firemen to check the fire were futile. The building was razed by flames as first occurred by the Lexington firemen in 1919, and the remains of the legislature building were left standing when the fire broke out.
