The management of the local warehouses assures growers that plenty of buyers will be here Tuesday, and that if any grower is dissatisfied with the price, his

trop will be loaded back on truck or wagon and not a cent charged him as warehouse fee or for this reloading. Could anything be fairer?

This market is easy for the grower to reach. He can haul his crop in on a wagon if he chooses. There will be no long waits, while his crop dries out. He may display his crop in baskets containing as little as he chooses to put on them. Selling will not be hurried. If he wishes to reject a few baskets he may do so and try again without having to drive a long distance to his home and drive back again a long distance, or stay in the distant town and pay his hotel bill. He is close to home-on a Home Market-where the money made in warehouse fees will go into the pockets of home workers

Don't let anyone convince you that the price will not be as good as on any loose leaf market in the state. This community has an opportunity to better itself, to reestablish a great industry here, to help unemployment with work that otherwise would be unavailable. It is up to us all to say whether we will accept the opportunity.
