A Notice To The Delinquent Tax Payers

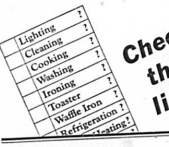

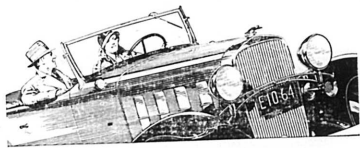
