Holiday Death Toll In U. S. Reaches 180

Victims and over-the-week-end holiday accidents and the weather combined to cause a heavy loss of life in the United States, a survey revealed Tuesday.

More than 180 deaths were reported most of them due to motor car accidents, no section of the country escaped.

A cold blast from the Canadian Northwest sent temperatures plunging to near and below zero in many sections of the Midwest. Wind was blown for at least five deaths due to exposure. Four of them were in Chicago where the mercury sank to 17 above.

Among the dead were a blind woman and her blind daughter, fatally burned during a Christmas celebration in their home at Baffle Creek, Mich. In Cleveland, a man perished in a fall while trying to lower a Christmas tree from a second story window.

At least eighty-five of the motor car deaths occurred in the Midwest. The South counted forty dead in automobile accidents. Pennsylvania had twenty dead in motor accidents on Christmas Day alone. All other sections of the country added to the total.

A train wreck near a water dam in Evansville, Okla., claimed four fatalities.

In Battle Creek, Mich., a child and infant brother were burned to death when straw spread on the floor as part of traditional Victorian ceremony was ignited, apparently from a stove.

At Chicago one plane crashed, forcing landing and regular transportation. All in ready hospital.

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W. N. White One Of Six At Confederate Homes

Discontinuance of the Kentucky Confederate home at Pewee Valley was recommended Tuesday by Board of Trustees.

The board reported that the property, which represents a large outlay for the state, should be sold or leased, without further expense.

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Mr. Howell reported that at the time of his examination in November they resulted in the loss of only six Confederate veterans in age from 71 to 92. They were: George W. Crystal, 89, Clark county; Isaac H. Hamblin, 82, Clinton; William B. Martin, 81, Hancock; Charles K. Morris, 81, Pulaski; William Boychick, 80, Louisville; A. N. White, 80, Clark.

Two of these veterans are totally blind and helpless, said the inspector. The other three are confined to their beds all the time. Only two of the six are capable of walking or moving around and one of these uses a wheel chair practically all the time. All in ready hospital.
