SALTWICK Wage-Hour Scale Set On U. S. Relief Work

Writers on state and local relief projects organized through federal funds will receive a minimum wage of 20 cents an hour. This was decided Friday under rules issued by Harry L. Hopkins, emergency relief administrator, who sought to carry out the intent of President Roosevelt's re-employment agreement by setting the minimum wage for relief work at 20 cents an hour.

IN ANSWER TO A LADY'S LETTER A lady writes to say that she does not understand why a 6-cylinder car does not cost more to run than a car with fewer cylinders.

The use of 6-cylinders does not mean the addition of two or four extra fuel consumers. It is not, for example, a 4-cylinder engine multiplied by two.

By reducing four larger explosions into eight smaller ones, we get the engine smoothness and quietness. Eight-cylinders indicate the way the gas is used, not the amount.

Two things use up gas—bad engine design and useless car weight. Besides having an engine that gets a high percentage of power out of the fuel, the Ford V-8 has a light, strong body and chassis so that no power is wasted in moving excess weight.

The only extravagance about the new Ford V-8 engine is in the building of it. The extravagance is curb—the economy is yours.

When the question of car economy comes clearing up, an economical car gives economy all round. Price, operation, upkeep all play their part. If what you save on gas you lose elsewhere, that is not economy.

As to upkeep, our dealers say that in recent years the improved quality of Ford cars has cut down their repair business 50 per cent. As to price with quality—judge for yourself.
