\$5,300,000 Taxes Paid by Railroads in Kentucky in 1940

Railroad operating in Kentucky paid a total of more than \$5,300,000 in taxes to the State, counties, cities and towns last year.

Of this amount, about \$2,645,000 went into General Funds; approximately \$960,000 went into State and county roads and cities; the remaining \$1,695,000 went into School Funds.

IN THIS COUNTY ALONE IN 1940 RAILROAD TAXES TOTALLED \$6,683.01

Thus the railroads paid a generous share of all the money required to conduct State, county and local business...

You can readily see by these figures that every section of our Commonwealth has its share in the property and earnings of Kentucky railroads.
