One Killed, Four Hurt In Wreck At Myers

One Negro was killed and four comrades injured Thursday afternoon at Myers when the automobile in which they were riding left the road and turned over several times.

The dead man was reported as James Arthur Young, 25, of Georgetown. Most seriously injured was Calvert Prager, 30, Negro, who suffered skull injuries and a broken nose. He was taken to the St. Joseph's hospital at Lexington where his condition at latest reports was described as serious.

Others injured, all of them Negroes, were: Robert Morgan, 30, head injured; Edna Dunlap, 28, fractured knee cap; and Margaret Robinson, 14, who suffered a broken arm. The party was enroute to Lexington.
