SLAUGHTER RULES MET

RE ORKED BY FARMERS

Since last May farmers have been permitted to slaughter livestock they own and sell the meat themselves. This has been a long time coming. The rules were adopted by the War Food Administration's Office of Distribution, has pointed out.

However, Mr. Dudley stated there has been a misunderstanding among farmers, retailers and the public as to the slaughter requirements farmers must meet. A farmer is defined as "any resident proprietor of a farm."

S. S. Hobbie, major general, U. S. Army, advised that the "resident proprietor" must be the "owner" as related to livestock slaughter of a farm, which is interpreted as the livestock which has been grown or fed for 60 days or more by the farmer.
