Editorials
Now Is The Time For All Good Men

If Democrats of Kentucky wish to elect a Democrat to the United States Senate they had better get together on some good, strong candidate who is of the proper caliber and who can supply leadership to a party still suffering from the ravages of a recent defeat. Under the above caption the Owensboro Messenger, on March 29, in a brilliant editorial from the pen of Lawrence Hager, able publisher, places stress on the serious need to nominate the right man. In the assurance that the observations of the Owensboro newspaper man will bear agreement with other patriots who read the Mercury, we believe it best to quote: "Democrats in Kentucky are in a situation that is unprecedented in the history of the Commonwealth. A United States Senator is to be elected in November. He will be a Democrat if party leaders unite on one man and the nomination is not without an intra-party fight. But Democrats refuse to recognize the danger and go sprawling into a bitter primary campaign. The Republicans will have a more than even chance to retain the Senate seat now held by a Republican three years ago was responsible for the election of a Republican governor who in turn appointed a Democrat to the United States Senate last summer, when Senator Chandler resigned to become commissioner of organized baseball.

Kentucky is normally a Democratic state, and it has been only when leaders fell out among themselves involving the party in factional disturbances and the Republicans took advantage of the wrangling to select their strongest man, that the Democratic renegade was beaten. The record is clear for all who will read it. It began in 1819 when an obscure country doctor from Crittenden county, William J. DuBois, was the winning Republican candidate for the Senate. It happened again in 1869, when wars of a primary fight made six months before hand carried the Republican banner to victory. And in 1921 when C. W. Branson, because some Democrats had their doubts as to his loyalty in a bitter primary and they wanted their doubts to be settled, lost out of staying home in the November election. Before the expiration of Ernie's term, another Republican, Fredrick M. Sackett, was elected to the Senate. When disturbances within the Democratic party have resulted in the election of a Republican United States Senator, party leaders ever invariably seen the necessity of choosing a nominee without the customary primary battle, one who would go into the fight against the Republican incumbent unscarred and fresh for the fray, with a united party behind him.

"Now another opportunity is at hand for the Democrats in Kentucky to show themselves more interested in maintaining party supremacy in the state than of inflicting the personal ambition of any candidate. Rumors are heard that a bitter intra-party many fight will be waged to peril the nominee, unless Democrats take counsel among themselves, and unite on one man who can lead the party to victory in November. There can be no questioning of the record of the late Governor Bradley, the first Republican governor in 1895, and his later election in 1909, that when Democrats were torn by intra-party strife, the nominees of Democratic party leaders, have this in mind, has seemed to be that Congressman Earle C. Hansen bears fewer unadmitted scars of political battle than any other man who might be chosen their party to victory. Right now we are most concerned with the Senate race. The only danger is a re- turn to join hands and battle the common enemy. It will not happen again, unless we fall into the old error and open the way for another Republican vic- tory.
