The Carlisle City Council, at its regular meeting this morning directed that an investigation be had on a subject which for some time has hopefully dwelt in the minds of many progressive citizens of the city—a modern natural gas system for Carlisle homes and business places.

This action was certainly a commendable one, and the committee and individuals to whom the matter was referred are fully capable of a thorough, comprehensive study of such a project, but the ultimate acquisition of it does on virtually every large civic undertaking—on the people themselves.

Until each potential gas user in the city decides to give full and aggressive support to the city officials in their gas program, the Council will be severely handicapped in accomplishing any material whatsoever.

Questions concerning the utility of gas in Carlisle have already been printed and in all parts of these forms will be distributed among the people of the city at a very early date. Filling out and mailing these forms will obligate the signer in no way, but the results of the five indications of interest in the utility of gas will stand behind any further action by the city. It is to be hoped that if and when these questionnaires reach the people, the results will show an overwhelming cooperative spirit on the part of every one interested in furthering the welfare of Carlisle.

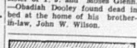

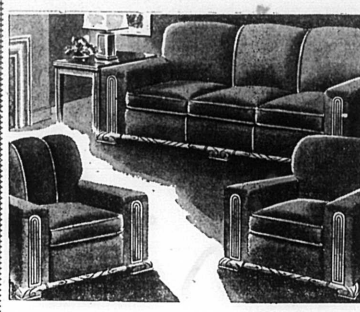
