Livestock Group To Meet Nov. 25

The annual state-wide meeting of the Kentucky Poultry Raisers Association will be held at the Sherburne Hotel in Louisville on Monday, November 25, at 10 o'clock. The president of the organization, C. H. Moore, will be the guest speaker. The meeting will start at 10 o'clock with a welcome address by Dr. H. L. Thompson, president of the University of Kentucky. Following this will be a business session and election of officers and directors for the coming year. Lunch will be served, compliments of the Kentucky Farm Bureau Journal, and Mr. Levi P. Moore, poultry director and secretary of the Indiana State Fair Board will be the principal speaker. Mr. Moore is also secretary of the Livestock Group.

On Kentucky Farms

Fifty-seven veterans in Ohio county accompanied Farm Agent Larson Miller on a tour of local farms and poultry equipment. Six hundred packages of seed for fall gardens were distributed to club members in Pike county. One thousand pounds of Ky. fine cream need have been saved by 50 farmers in Wilmore county in last year. Approximately 450 tons of lime were delivered to Elliott county farmers in one month. Mrs. Logan Duvoss of the Schockh Homesteaders Club in Logan county and her husband have refurnished about 200 pieces of furniture. H. S. Hall of Pulaski county stated that ammonium nitrate in the 1945-46 season, increased his barley yield 10 bushels per acre. Then double the legumes following barley. Expect Record Hunting Season

A record crop of hunters was expected to take to the fields Wednesday in quest of the fat, legged rabbit and the plump, white pheasant. While reviewing the sharp increase in number of hunters last season, Earl Walker, director of the Division of Game and Fish, predicted an even greater movement afield among sportsmen this year. "We had 105,919 hunting licenses last year, and with the boys back from the service would not be surprised to see more than 100,000 new hunters this season," Walker said. He added that despite such an onslaught on the wildlife population, he felt new sportsmen would enjoy better hunting this year. Increased stocking of small game and an apparent abundance of rabbits bolstered his optimism. He could offer the "hard" duck hunters little consolation, though, in view of new federal regulations which are bound to put a crimp in the duck season. The 1946-47 season, extending from November 30 through January 15, is augmented by duck shooting from November 23 to January 6; grouse from November 23 to January 6; and quail from November 23 to January 15, and a tentative open deer hunt from December 21 to January 21. All dates inclusive. The waterfowl season also permits shooting brant and geese, but there is no open season on Canada geese. Snow and blue geese may be taken according to Federal regulations. The quail season which has been in progress since August 15 closes to sportsmen on December 31. The deer season is contingent upon approval of provisions from the Bernheim Foundation for hunting in Bernheim Forest in Bullitt county, where a live hunt was conducted last winter.
