Vote For School Board Members
Who Oppose The Construction Of A
New Nicholas County High School

The Nicholas County Board of Education is trying to "saddle" the cost of a NEW NICHOLAS COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING on the TAXPAYERS of Nicholas County. Mr. Roy Terrell, Chairman of the Board, and Mr. Blair Stephenson are members of the present Board of Education which favors such action.

Mr. Homer Hillock and Mrs. Elsie S. Terrell, do not favor the building program and the voters from Educational Division No. 1 comprising the precincts of Headquarters, Taylors Store, Morning Glory, and that portion of City Building lying outside of the Carlisle Graded School District should vote for Mr. Hillock, and the voters from Educational Division No. 5 comprising the precincts of East Union, Dennels Seales, and that portion of Mathias No. 1 and Mathias No. 2 lying outside of the Carlisle Graded School District should vote for Mrs. Terrell.

Your protest committee believes these are the facts and issues before the voters and the reasons why the above candidates, Mr. Hillock and Mrs. Terrell should have your full support for election to the county board.

1. Headquarters

A. The Nicholas County Board of Education in 1947-1948 withdrew payment of tuition to the Carlisle High School so as to provide, AS THEY SAY, an "A" grade high school at Headquarters. Yet simultaneously with this action, the same board of education purchased a site for a new high school building just outside the city limits of Carlisle. In other words, the Nicholas County Board of Education had no primary desire to make the school at Headquarters an "A" grade school, when by their own actions, they demonstrated louder than words that the real purpose was, in fact, to force the Carlisle High School to be discontinued entirely, and within two years thereafter, if a new building could be completed in such time, to ELIMINATE THE HIGH SCHOOL AT HEADQUARTERS ENTIRELY.

B. The Nicholas County Board of Education will have you believe that in the year 1947-1948, the Headquarters High School might have been closed for lack of students. Yet, in June, 1947, the Carlisle Board of Education offered to consolidate with the Nicholas County Board of Education, and had such consolidation been accepted by the County Board, the County Superintendent would have been in a position to arrange school attendance at Carlisle and at Headquarters so as to have insured an "A" grade school at both locations.

C. Headquarters High School was built in 1928 with several costly additions having been made since then. It is prudent to discontinue this building as a high school, when the estimated life of this building should be at least 30 years and it has only been used 20 years.

2. Consolidation

A. The Nicholas County Board of Education has not accepted any offers of the Carlisle Board of Education for consolidation. The last of these offers was made as late as September 2, 1948, when the Carlisle Board offered to consolidate according to the Statutes of the State of Kentucky.

B. The Nicholas County Board of Education has repeatedly refused any efforts of consolidation unless the Carlisle Board would agree to a new, costly, high school building. This PERSONAL condition of the Nicholas County Board, which is not provided by the Statutes of Kentucky, was not acceptable to the Carlisle Board.

C. The Carlisle Board of Education finds itself in a strange, yet true, position. By refusing to agree to a new high school building, they have been trying to save their friends in the County. INCREASED TAXES FOR THE NEXT 30 YEARS. Is the Carlisle Board to be criticized for trying to help their fellow-men in the County? NO.

3. Tuition

A. The Nicholas County Board of Education complains that it has paid \$50,450.25 for tuition to the Carlisle Board since 1933, and it is made to appear that it got nothing in return for all of this money.

B. If in 1945-1946, the last year county students were permitted to come to Carlisle on a tuition-paid basis, the total students amounted to approximately 65, and if the average per year would be approximately 65 county students enrolled at Carlisle, then from 1933 to 1946, inclusive, the County Board of Education has had 845 students trained in Carlisle at the cost of approximately \$59,000 per student.

C. The Nicholas County Board of Education forgot to say that the last year they had county students in the Carlisle High School, they paid approximately \$3,500, while it cost the Carlisle Board of Education approximately \$17,000 per year to operate the high school. With the total high school enrollment in the Carlisle High School comprised of approximately 65 county students and 65 living in Carlisle, yet the Carlisle Board appropriated approximately \$13,500 to the County's \$3,500 to train these young men and women.

B. You, Mr. Voter, Cannot Vote on the Issuance of Bonds, but You Can Vote for the School Board Members who decide whether such a step is to be taken by the board.

We urge you to vote for candidates who are NOT IN FAVOR of issuing bonds for a new high school building. These candidates are:

4. Taxes

A. In 1946, the COUNTY TAXPAYER paid a county school tax rate of .85 cents per \$100.

In 1947, the COUNTY TAXPAYER paid a county school tax rate of \$1.20 per \$100.

In 1948, the COUNTY TAXPAYER paid (or will pay) a county school tax rate of \$1.40 per \$100.

In 1949 and until 1979, if a NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING is built, your tax rate, MR. TAXPAYER, will be at least the legal limit of \$1.50 per \$100 and possibly more.

B. In other words, the man who in 1946 paid \$100 in TAXES, will in 1949 and until 1979 probably pay at least \$175 per year, or \$2,250 as his individual share of the cost of an unnecessary building program. DO YOU, MR. TAXPAYER, WANT TO ASSUME SUCH AN INDEBTEDNESS ON YOURSELF?

C. Complaint has been made that the Carlisle School Board demands a \$130 tax rate. The Carlisle School Board has offered to consolidate and whatever tax rate is set will be by the consolidated Board of Education.

D. The Carlisle Board of Education has had a \$130 tax rate because the total assessed valuation of taxable property in the Carlisle Graded School District is approximately \$1,999,916, whereas, the total assessed valuation of taxable property in the County School District is approximately \$6,276,655. Certainly it does not require more details to show why the Carlisle Board has been required to tax its supporters more than the county with its greater property valuation.

E. The County Board of Education admits that 20% of each dollar it collects goes for a building fund. Why is it necessary to impose even 1c of this 20% on the taxpayer when, with consolidation of the County and City Districts, there will be AMPLE BUILDINGS to house and train all students in the county and the city.

5. Actual Indebtedness and Anticipated Indebtedness

A. From figures available to all TAXPAYERS, the list below is an approximation of actual indebtedness or anticipated indebtedness which the County of Nicholas and the City of Carlisle finds it self facing—TODAY:

B. While all of the above indebtedness does not have a 30 year period to run before it is paid off, it is interesting to note that at an interest rate of 3%, the TAXPAYERS will have to pay an additional approximate amount of \$30,000 FOR INTEREST ALONE. Thus, the total indebtedness may be said to be approximately as follows:

6. Bonds

A. A great majority of money is procured by the issuance of REVENUE BONDS, which do not require or allow a vote of the PEOPLE as to whether they should or should not be issued.
