Let There Be (More) Light

A recent study of lighting in Carlisle's business district made by The Mercury shows that only 11.6 percent of the city's merchandise store establishments receive sufficient lighting from exterior sources to illuminate their store fronts and the adjacent street. The remaining 88.4 percent, after midnight, are in semi-darkness.

There is still another phase of this matter which is as important as its influence on prices.
