Widening The Health Highway

At the end of February, medical fairs and community leaders from all parts of the country will meet in Kentucky. The conference will be sponsored by the Council on Rural Health of the American Medical Association, which deal with such rural health problems as providing adequate medical care and insuring the rural health program with the progress of a nation.

The demand for the rural health program has not lessened. Speakers will include doctors, representatives of the rural health program, state officials, the Virginia Polytechnic Institute and other agencies.

The movement for rural health is not new. In 1917, when the A.M.A. Council was developed. A year later, the AMA Council was held, which was attended in marked degree by the rural health program.

The approach to the rural health problem is a refreshing one based on the principle that people should be encouraged to help themselves. Special stress is laid on the establishment of community health centers, through which all segments of the community can work together to improve conditions. It is recognized that physicians must take the lead in health planning, but the Council is a group of individuals who will be far more successful if they have community-wide understanding and support from civic, professional, religious, labor, agricultural and all other groups.

The theme for this year meeting is "Widening the Highway to Health." It is symbolic of the progress that is being made in bettering medical care everywhere in the great country, the little towns, and on the farm.

We Need More Buchanans

Everyone is fascinated by a success story. Making good against all odds has become a great tradition because it is a kind of opportunity and the right of every individual to make the most of these opportunities was proclaimed.

Buchanan, Georgia, after World War II was about as destitute as any community could be and still not become a ghost town. With a population of about 500 it lay in a declining cotton area. Young folks were leaving to seek better opportunities elsewhere.

At the end of the war a couple of veterans who lived in Buchanan decided to do something about the situation. They realized the extent of the catastrophe they had to turn to. They interested a large shirt manufacturing concern in leasing the factory. The credit was the town's largest shirt mill by its boot strap out of debt.

Hundreds of local people were employed in the factory. Within a year there was money to buy the county house square, build a new school and a new church.
