## The Right to Know, to Vote

"Every man, woman and child in the United States of America was born with the right to know what our public officials are doing with the responsibility entrusted to them. Election to public office is both an honor and a trust. Mr. Charles L. Allen, assistant dean, Mott School of Journalism, Northwestern University. "It is an honor manifested by the faith that voters have shown in the successful candidate. It is a trust of that candidate's inherent honesty, ability and willingness to serve his constituency. Accounting for his stewardship directly to the man and woman who elected him is as much an essential part of American government as the exercise of the franchise itself."

There are nearly 1000 registered voters eligible to vote in Saturday's Carlisle graded school district election. Many a very surprising number of these voters died so that they can vote for any one of the six candidates whose names appear on the school ballot as long as only three are voted upon, and on the event the candidates appear not to be those they are privileged to choose in this country to vote in the names of their fathers.

In 1947 less than two months of the registered voters expressed any interest in how their school affairs were managed in 1934 only 43 persons took the trouble to journey over to the Carlisle City School building and exercise a privilege that many of us thought for and the many died in a noble cause. Many will be able to vote on Saturday, May 3, 1934, the trouble to vote.

**Encounter Holds Substantive Lead Over Kefauver in "Trial Heat"**

Princeton, New Jersey—A survey of the nation's voters, questioned by United States Poll staff reporters in a survey just completed, set they would vote for Dwight D. Eisenhower if he were running for President on the Republican ticket against Senator Estes Kefauver on the Democratic ticket.

Nearly two out of every five say they would vote for Senator Kefauver.

In other words, at the present time the nation's voters prefer Eisenhower over Kefauver 52 to 48 percent, or nearly two to one.

Who would vote for Eisenhower if he were running for President on the Republican ticket against Senator Estes Kefauver on the Democratic ticket?

A similar trial survey between Senator Kefauver and President Eisenhower was reported by the United States Poll in March, 1933. At that time, the vote divided as follows:

Eisenhower Kefauver  
Reported on March 12, 1933:  
Eisenhower 37% Kefauver 39% Undecided 24%

In the 1932 Presidential election, Eisenhower received 64 per cent of the two party vote, Stevenson 34 per cent.

In other words, if the Presidential Election were being held today, Eisenhower would probably run as well against Kefauver as he did in 1932 against Hoover and not better.

It must be understood that today's poll findings reflect only current sentiment and that opinion may change between now and next November.

Today's vote indicates that Eisenhower's margin over Kefauver comes from the President's popularity with labor, president and GOP voters, as well as a Democratic vote, held today. Eisenhower would probably run as well against Kefauver as he did in 1932 against Hoover and not better.
