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### A sharp distinction

Adlai Stevenson made sharp distinction between his reasoning on an enduring safe peace and that of the Eisenhower administration in a recent television broadcast to the nation on the H-bomb.

The distinction is between Stevenson's willingness to accept defeat in the search for a way to tame the H-bomb, and the administration's unwillingness to consider or discuss new ideas in this all-important field.

The key to Mr. Stevenson's attitude is contained in this paragraph:

"This is one matter which the defendant who is nothing can do more than be repeated. I say that something can be done. That the deadlock can be broken. That the world can be made safe and toward peace."

Toward this end, Mr. Stevenson proposes to make "the first order of business," if elected President, to seek an agreement with the other great powers on limiting large H-bomb tests by conference or by consultation. At whatever level, whatever the circumstances might suggest would be most fruitful.

Clearly, Mr. Stevenson intends not only to make this "the first order of business," but he also intends to give it his personal attention as Chief Executive.

In contrast to Mr. Stevenson's willingness to confer "at whatever level at whatever place" necessary, as President Eisenhower's flat assertion that he has said his "last word" on this subject which affects the very future of mankind. As Mr. Stevenson said: "This is one subject on which there cannot be. There must not be any last word."

As Adlai Stevenson said: "We cannot break the hydrogen bomb under the rug. We must not make a fresh start on the barriers to world disarmament and world peace necessary, as President Eisenhower's flat assertion that he has said his "last word" on this subject which affects the very future of mankind.
