SOLDIERS MAJORITY OF PUBLIC THINKS THAT ANYONE WHO HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO GO TO COLLEGE SHOULD GO TO COLLEGE.

Princeton, N. Jersey—Who should go to college? Just the brightest men in each high school class? All those with ability to do college work? Or only those who want to go? To find out how rank and file students feel on this important question, MAN ON THE STREET and his people recently interviewed more than 2,000 people in all walks of life—those with little formal schooling, people who have attended high school, and those with partial or complete college education.

Results of the survey make one thing unmistakably clear: people interviewed do not think that only the brightest should be sent to college. In fact, only 4 in each 100 talked to think that just the brightest people should go to college.

At the same time, survey findings show that two out of every three are of the opinion that anyone who has the ability to do college work and who wants to go should.

Furthermore, a substantial majority more than one out of every four, believe that any high school graduate who wants to go to college should go.

An interesting difference of opinion is found among those who live in big cities on the one hand and their smaller towns and rural neighbors on the other.

For example, nearly two out of every five big city people are of the opinion that any high school graduate who wants to go to college should go, whereas among rural area people, only about one in five shares this opinion.

In addition, the smaller size of the community, the larger the proportion believing that any one with ability who wants to go to college should go.

State Museum has old salt making kettle

One of our salt kettles is displayed in the Old State House.

Such non-metallic kettles were used by salt makers frequently until the late 1800s. The kettle is made of iron and is about 18 inches in diameter and 12 inches deep. It is made of iron and is about 18 inches in diameter and 12 inches deep.

It does resemble a "shell" kettle, but its significance as a home-manufactured product of the early days of the salt industry is of great interest. It was made in 1845 in Lexington, one of the early iron centers of Kentucky.
