HOLIDAY STAINS
Stains on table cloths, mats or napkins should be removed as quickly as possible, and always before the pieces are put in the

general laundry, say UK Extension, have economic. There are common stains resulting from holiday entertaining.
Gravy should be scraped off with a dull knife, then the spot sponged with cold or lukewarm water. If a grease spot remains after the fabric dries, sponge with a grease solvent, then wash in warm suds and rinse.
Cranberry or other cooked fruit should be sponged with cold water; if the spot remains pour boiling water on it from a height of several inches. On white fabrics, chlorine may be used.
