Killer in the home

Most housewives—there's a killer in your home!
But you don't need weapons to defend yourself. The National Safety Council says. Just common sense and a lot of caution.
The killer? Poison. They lurk everywhere—in the medicine cabinet, under the kitchen sink, on dressing tables, even in food tins on food shelves in the workroom and in your sleeping closet.
These unassuming killers in the home the Council points out take more than 1,000 lives annually. They take a steady toll throughout the year—about 100 lives a month.
Most frequent victims are children 5 years of age or younger. But right up there are some poison victims are persons in the 25-44 and 65-84 age groups.
The types of accidental poisoners are as varied as the containers they come in—bleach, permanent wave solution, shampoo, nail polish remover, furniture polish, kerosene, bleaches, but killers, paint removers.
Signatures of the killer? They are just about every instance there's an accomplice to the crime—carelessness or ignorance.
For example, some potential poisoners are properly labeled—but a lot are not. Do not eat anything that is a product of a poison. And some instructions, however simple, are not always read or properly followed. Do not use any medicine, especially in a child's case, without a doctor's prescription in a recent year—bring examples of the labels to the Council representative. It is a troublesome household commodity, especially in rural areas and in the South.
Old kerosene, too, can be bioparasites for children. They can be poisonous if you paint on window sills and frames, or if you breathe the fumes.
Do not use lead paint in any case.
How to prevent poisoning?
1. "Education," the Council says. "Parents should be made aware of the dangers lurking in their homes."
2. Do not use state and federal laws. "Tighten laws should be lifted on bottles or cans containing poisonous substances—even products valuable to everyday living."
