Spring planting delayed by weather; businessmen attend golf game

Brushy Fork was higher Sunday than at any time in the past five years. Backwater from the swollen stream almost reached a number of homes in the lower part of town, but no damage was reported. Only the fact that the channel of the creek was cleaned out a few days ago prevented heavy damage to homes and caused heavy rains during the week and forced more than 200 families in the Ohio Valley from their homes and caused heavy damage.

The county agent office reports that 750 Nicholas County farmers have signed farm work sheets indicating their intention to cooperate with the Agricultural Conservation Program.

Work is being pushed rapidly by the new garage of W. R. Busin on Elm street.

Spring planting, especially of gardens, is later this season than in many years, farmers say. Rain of the past month has delayed planting and preparation of land and soil weather has retarded growth of vegetation that was planted.
