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City votes to seek engineer's help in fixing industrial water rates

The City Council of Carlisle, met in regular session Monday night with the following in attendance: Mayor William Prewer; City Attorney Roger Womack and City Clerk Mrs. Robert Harper. Councilmen present were Teddy Poe, William Harper, Emory Hollar and Robert Coatsy.

Building Permit
A building permit was issued G. C. Myers to tear down a wall on his property on Broadway and rebuild same. The motion to issue the permit was made by Coatsy, seconded by Hollar.

Two Small Leaks
On motion by Coatsy, seconded by Harper, the clerk was authorized to advertise for bids for the cleaning and painting of the interior of both stand pipes at the reservoir. It was noted that the newest tank has two small leaks. Two coats of paint are to be applied to the inside of each tank.

Dark Spots
A plan to brighten up the town was presented council by Grant Bell, Lexington engineer, Kentucky Utilities. He is a partner in the company with industrial Morris Whitley and Council trial price scale for water used in very large quantities. The motion was made by Coatsy and seconded by Hollar.

Hills were read and approved. Payment was on motion by Poe. The city now pays about \$225.37

Chest x-ray free today

The x-ray trailer, donated for use in Nicholas and surrounding counties by the Benquet and Protection Order of 1943, will be in Carlisle, Thursday, August 10 (today). Everyone 20 and over is urged by the Nicholas County Health Department to visit the trailer. Persons who have had chest contacts with T.B. cases are especially urged to have an x-ray made. No person under 20 years of age is to come, for an x-ray unless he has had a positive skin test. Dr. B. P. Reynolds, Health Officer, said this week. Exceptions will be made subject to a physician's written request.

Also no women in the first three months of pregnancy can be x-rayed by the mobile unit. Other pregnant women may be x-rayed if they have had a positive skin test reading.

The following is the schedule: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Lt. Gov. Wyatt praises lake resort development

Recent progress toward building the Nicholas County Lake resort was noted here Tuesday night by Lt. Gov. Wilson V. Wyatt.

Speaking at a community potluck supper, Wyatt praised the people of Nicholas County and the Nicholas County Development Corporation for their efforts.

"Starting with an idea and a dream," said Wyatt, "you have made them realities."

The resort area with a 150-acre lake, raised \$400,000 in less than one month. This is approximately one-half the cost of the total area.

The remaining \$45,000 to \$50,000 is expected to be raised in the next 60 to 90 days.

Called Significant
The lieutenant governor noted, "This is a significant accomplishment and one that might well serve as an example for larger communities."

The project will be a part of the state chain of lakes program. The dam, for the lake, will be formed by a new rural second ary road to run between U. S. 58 and Ky. 32. The state participation in the project amounts to approximately \$100,000, the cost of converting the highway fill into a dam.

Pointing out that all of Kentucky's progress is based on the name "Persistence, enthusiasm and community attitude as you have shown here," Wyatt noted that the lake resort would provide needed recreational facilities and also be an added inducement for industry.

"A wide awake community, concerned with its future progress and development and the will to translate that concern into concrete action, always creates a highly favorable impression on a company looking for a new location," Wyatt said.

Foreman Growth
The lieutenant governor said Kentucky is well on the way to establishing a broad base of thriving industrial economic growth pattern.

"The story of Kentucky," Wyatt told the audience, "is to affect, the future progress and development of our own effort here in Carlisle and Nicholas County where intensive planning, hard work and persistence, and enthusiasm are soon to result in creation of a new attraction for the area—the Nicholas County Lake resort."
