Sod webworm
 ruining lawns
 LEXINGTON—The sod webworm is causing many home lawns to look dead and brown, the insecticides. Do NOT mow the lawn for about one week after the application.
 If the sod webworms in a half to three-quarters of an inch long and brownish-black in color are very numerous, a second application may be necessary.
 The worms, the larva of a moth, feeds on grasses. It stays above ground usually and cuts grass blades off close to the ground.
 Lawns not attacked recently will get brown, dead spots.
Control measures:
TORAXENE: Use 4 ounces of the 40 percent wettable powder or 2 fluid ounces of the emulsion concentrate (strength of the emulsion concentrate is 6 pounds of actual material per 1,000 square feet).
