 Winter barley producers have the opportunity of participating in the 1962 feed grain program, according to H. S. Vico, Chairman, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Administration. Sign up for winter barley producers will take place laboratories at the University of Kentucky during the month of September-October.

 College of Agriculture experts say that the soil in many areas of the county needs lime to correct acid production and soil fertility. The application of available plant foods by other row crops will be most efficient if lime increases the pH of the soil making for greater efficiency to Nicholas County farmers.
 Approximately 75 percent of county soil need lime, according to a report by R. K. Agromoni, R. N. Drakell. Only about 1 acre is lined for each 100 acres of soil. Limestone does toxic substances and soil acids to provide a more suitable place for plant roots to grow.
 Cost shares at the rate of 50% of cost per ton are offered under the fall ACP practice, Mr. Vico said. The fall season is favorable for spreading lime and lime may be applied to land before fall breaking and seeding to all soils, grasses, or winter cover crops. It may also be applied to top dressing to fields already in grass. The land on which lime is used under the Government program is required to be planted in a planter to use lime this fall are urged to make applications at the county ASCS office before the practice started in order that they may be eligible for cost-sharing under the Agricultural Conservation Program.

 corn and grain sorghum—designated as "winter barley." The acreage of the College of Kentucky has been scheduled to begin in September and cut Government costs.
 Spring barley signups probably will be in March-April at certain acreage during the time.
 Those desiring barley acreage to an approved contracting use will receive payments which will cover the cost of their income level.
 The winter barley, approximately half of the diversion payment will be available at sign-up time, and the balance after compliance is checked in 1962. The 1962 national average support level for barley will not be less than for 1961.
 About the first of September, county ASCS officers will mail producers information concerning base acreage and yields (established on the basis of 1959-60 average acreage and production and payment rates per acre).
 Mr. Vico said that the minimum diversion under the barley program will be 20 percent of the farm base (1959-60 acreage). Up to 20 acres may be diverted if this is more than 20 percent of the base. The maximum diversion will be (a) 40 acres if the farm base had 20 acres plus 20 percent of the base. In no case can the diversion be more than the base as the following lines will reveal:
