**Home Garden Strawberries**  
If you're buying the patch for another year, now the weeds and plants in area, keeping the cutter bar above the crowns of the plants. Fertilize at once at the rate of 600 pounds of 5-10-10 fertilizer per acre. Cultivate the middle leaving the rows 18 inches wide.  
**Tobacco Plant Bed Management**  
After the tobacco crop is set and the need for plants is determined, the plant bed should be plowed to destroy any remaining plants. If the soil has been used as a mulch bed for three or four years it will probably be better to grow next year's plants in another location. The case, the old plant bed site should be sown to some permanent grass and clover mixture.  
The mowing of the plant bed is necessary in order to keep up the soil structure and to prevent manure deficiency from especially likely to develop with continued burning or steaming of a plant bed that is used year after year.  
If the plant bed has been used only one or two years, it should be plowed and seeded to soybeans. The legume will help maintain desirable soil structure. When the soybeans are plowed down late in the summer of early fall, 1 to 1 cup alfalfa cake flour, 1 teaspoon baking soda, and 1/2 tea-
