### Wool incentive payment set

A shorn wool incentive price of 42 cents per pound has been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the 1962 marketing year which begins April 1, 1962. The mohair support price is set at 74 cents per pound. According to H. S. Vice, Chairman, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, the 1962 price for shorn wool is the same as for the first 7 years of the program—from 1955 through the 1961 marketing year. The mohair price is up 1 cent from the 1961 level for 1961.

Payments to producers for the 1962 marketing year will follow the same methods used for the current 1961 year. Shorn wool payments will be equal to a percentage of each producer's cash returns from wool sales. The percentage will be that which is required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool up to the incentive price of 42 cents per pound.

Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have never been shorn. The payments will be a rate per hundredweight of live animals marketed to compare on a basis comparable to the national average incentive payment per pound of shorn wool. Payments for the 1962 marketing year will be made on shorn wool and unborn lambs.
