Local P.T.A. Meets Sept. 12

The Carlisle P.T.A. will meet Tuesday evening, Sept. 12, at 7:30 p.m. at the Carlisle city 1960-61, the Nicholas County School Lunch Program served a total of 124,504 lunches to Nicholas County school children. Of this number, 10,790 were free lunches to needy children. The need for free lunches is greater than the school lunch program can handle without further assistance. The local school lunch program is strictly non-profit and does not receive a certain amount of commodities donated by the Federal Government in addition to an average rate of reimbursement which ran last year from 4 to 6¢ per Type A lunch. However, the reimbursement was completely cut for the month of May and to only 16¢ per lunch for the month of April. This severe cut in reimbursement funds has left the Nicholas County School Lunch Program short of operating funds.

Civil Defense Notes

FALL OUT SHELTERS
If you have a basement in your home the least expensive shelter can be constructed at a small cost. Choose a corner of your basement which is as near underground as possible. If any windows exist they must be closed up with concrete blocks or bricks to make a solid wall. Your shelter should be built to provide at least 10 square feet of space per person in your family. Using the two existing corner walls in your basement, construct two additional walls, to make a square room, leaving a doorway at one side of the existing basement wall. Use solid 4x8 inch concrete blocks leaving four small spaces in the first run of blocks to provide ventilation. These walls should not be over two feet from the other wall. Build another wall the same height as your shelter across the end where you have left the doorway. This wall is very important as it furnishes an angle in the entrance which radiation will not travel through as it travels in straight lines. This wall should not be over two feet from the other wall. Concrete, brick, earth or sand are some materials heavy enough to absorb radiation. 8 inches of concrete, 10 inches brick, 12 inches of earth, 16 inches of paper or 30 inches of wood give the same protection.
