## ASC committee elections near

Partners who are participating in one or more of the national farm programs administered locally by Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation farmer-committees were reminded today that committee elections will be taking place on Tuesday, September 26.

Such participation is required in order to be eligible to cast a ballot for the men a farmer wants to represent him on the committee. Eligible voters must also 1) have an interest in a farm as owner, tenant, or share-cropper if they are of legal voting age, or 2) be in charge of the operation and conduct of the farming operations on an individual farm if they are not legal voters.

Programs administered by the ASC county and community committees include acreage allotments, marketing quotas, commodity loans, the food grain program, the Sugar Act Program, the National Wool Program, the Agricultural Conservation Program, the Conservation Reserve Program, farm storage facilities, and other programs assigned by the Secretary of Agriculture.

## New laws effect wheat allotments

Due to new legislation on wheat allotments or marketing quota exemptions, will not be able to harvest wheat for grain. Any acreage planted to wheat to fall on the ground will be considered wheat for grain after June 1, 1962. In the past any farmer would harvest 15 acres or less without penalty. Under the new wheat program, this 15 acre exemption is not effective unless the farmer has a contract of the farming operations on an individual farm if they are not legal voters.
