At the regular weekly meeting of the stockholders and interested citizens held on Thursday, September 21st, very favorable reports were in evidence as to the development of the new Nicholas County Lake Project.

Sufficient funds from lot sales were available to acquire the farm formerly owned by Bruce Ingels and on Friday, September 22nd, a deed for it was obtained from his widow, Mrs. Sue Ingels. This means that the Nicholas County Development Corporation now owns approximately 500 acres of ground out of an estimated 700 acre tract of land which was the goal originally of established lands to be acquired for the lake project and the 440 Camp Site.

Large signs, which are to be erected at the entrance to the lake site, are being painted by Eugene Neal and it is anticipated that these signs will be erected within the next few days.

The Name The Lake Contest is to be officially closed on October 1st and the Development Corporation Officers urged anyone who had not submitted a name for the lake to do so by September 30th so that a decision can be reached for a name for the project. The public is reminded that the person submitting the successful name will be awarded a \$25.00 Sport E-War Savings Bond.

Because of the enthusiasm with which this project has been received, the Corporation officers were able to announce that as soon as twenty-five more lake-side lots are sold they will completely pay for all of the remaining land which the Corporation now owns.
