### Georgian dies in auto wreck

A car attempting to pass two autos near here Friday afternoon left the road and struck a tree, killing a Georgia man and injuring two others, State Police said.

Edward Cecil Cluey, 57, of Ringgold, Ga., Route 1, died at the scene of the accident. Five miles west of here on U.S. 68, he suffered head and chest injuries.

The driver of the car, hospital John Charles Cluey, 16, also of Ringgold, suffered head and face lacerations, but was not admitted to the hospital.

John Charles Cluey, 16, was admitted to the Nicholas County Hospital with a broken arm and severe lacerations on the head and face.

State Trooper Ed Post and Sheriff W. R. Dolins had the Cluey vehicle traveling west attempted to pass a car driven by Clarence Thomas Jr., 25, of Fleming, and another vehicle in front of the Thomas auto.

The officers were told the Thomas car pulled out in the left lane to pass the first car at the same time the Cluey vehicle was trying to pass.

Post said the Cluey and Thomas cars collided slightly, then the Cluey vehicle went west of the left side of the road, over an embankment down 30 feet into a ditch and hit a tree.

The Cluey car was demolished. No charges were filed.

The body was taken from the Mathers-Shearer Funeral Home here to the John R. Hay Funeral Home, Buffalo, N. Y.
