grain introduced into it, 2. Whether the area is used for a feed lot where grain is or has been placed on the ground, 3. Whether grain crops have been knocked down or cut down. Clark said that either the host or owner will know the answers to these questions.

If the answer to any of the three questions is in the affirmative, the area, as a rule is illegal and should be avoided by following these three simple rules," Clark continued, "the dove regulations become an easy matter to understand."

The regulations, from a federal standpoint, were discussed at length by William Davis, Atlanta, chief of Law Enforcement Section, Southeast, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The meeting was presided over by Frank Phlips, director, Enforcement Division. Attending were W. Parker and W. Lee Patricks, county officers.

The dove season opens in Kentucky on September 1 and continues through October 31, except on December 1 and continues through November 9. The bag limit is 12 per day, with a possession limit of 24. The possession limit, if was departed out, does not apply to a possession in the field, but to a limit of 24 which may be held in a deep freezer or in a car after two or more days of hunting only.

The officers were instructed that innocent hunters are not to be victimized but those exceeding the bag limit and possession limit and illegal bagging methods are to be arrested so far as is possible. The officers were reminded that

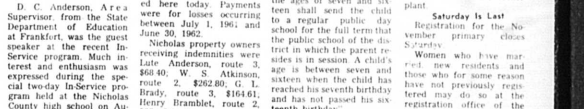
