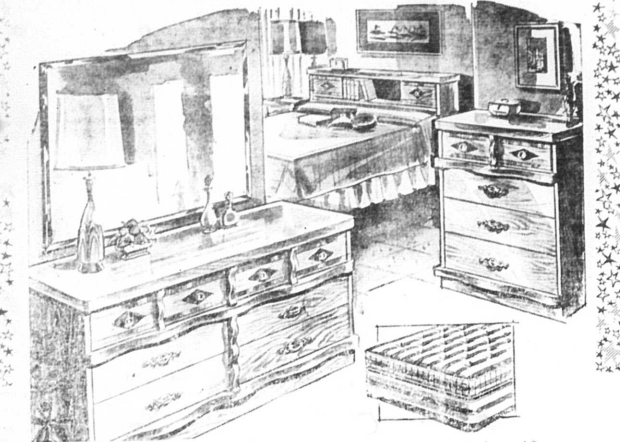

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

QUESTION: My classification has been changed from IV-F to IV. Explain this classification.

ANSWER: Registrants classified IV are qualified for military service only in time of war or national emergency.

Boating safety schools planned

QUESTION: My wife and I both work under social security. How is her benefit figured when she is old enough to apply?

ANSWER: Tax withholding started January 1, 1937. The law was passed in 1935.

NEWS OF SELECTIVE SERVICE

QUESTION: Can I register for Selective Service in the city where I am now working and have my registration transferred to my home town?

ANSWER: Yes. Any person required to be registered may present himself for registration at the office of any local board. The address given on Line 2 of the Registration Card determines the local board.

U.S. Rat Damage Is Equal To 100,000 Garage Farms

LEXINGTON—As animals grow in size, the rat is fairly small.

John Smart signs contract with ball club

John Smart, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Smart, 113 East Ninth-st., Park, formerly of Carlisle, and the grandson of W. D. Rudolph, Main St., Carlisle, has signed a baseball contract with the New York Mets of the National League.

Smart was one of the standouts on last year's baseball team at Wittenburg University, Springfield, Ohio, being named first team catcher on the All-Ohio Conference team selected by the coaches of the conference.

In addition to his catching ability the heavy hitting Smart paced the conference in runs batted in last season having 22 RBIs in 20 games.

He was listed among the top hitters in the conference with 24 hits in 78 trips to the plate for a .308 batting mark. Smart also hit .300 in 111 at-bats for hitting the most triples in the loop.

A former Louisville Man U High School star, Smart earned first team All-State recognition when he was named to the Kentucky baseball team in 1958. He was an outfielder then.

Smart, who signed as a catcher with the New York Mets, talked with a number of minor league scouts and also considered Houston, but decided that the opportunity was greater with the Mets.

Smart will report to Columbus, Ga., for spring training. He probably will be assigned to the Quincy, Ark., club in the Midwest League, according to special information.

Louis Rondolino, atorney and a St. Petersburg municipal judge, died of a heart attack on Thursday morning, Nov. 29, at Mount Park hospital. He was 39 years old. A native of New York City, Judge Rondolino enlisted in the Navy in 1943 and served on a destroyer in the Pacific. After World War II he received a law degree from the University of Michigan. Judge Rondolino moved to St. Petersburg in 1953, and was associated with the law firm of Holland, Betts, and Earle, and later with Judge Knodelino as a member of the First Methodist Church of St. Petersburg, Florida, Michigan, and American bar associations and past secretary of the St. Petersburg Bar Association. He also was a member of the Sunshine City Kiwanis Young Democrats Club, the PTA, and the National League of the Young Men's Association. He is survived by his wife, Nell, and four children, Tony, John, John and Donna.

NCHS Debate team gets winner plaque

Nicholas County high school debaters, Edward Taylor and James Wesley, defeated Flagstaff high school, Louisville, Saturday at the University of Kentucky as the winner of the Nicholas County Debate of the Month.

The Nicholas County team affirmed the Kentucky High School debate topic pertaining to the foreign trade policies of the United States.

The United States Should Promote a Common Market for the Western Hemisphere. The Flagstaff team, after James and Edward Green, opposed this proposition.

Judging the debate were Arthur Taylor, former UK osteoprenology speaker and now first year student in the College of Law, Denis Curtis (former UK debater and All American award winner) and Dr. Clifford Blanton, debate coach of the University of Kentucky.

The University of Kentucky Student Forum, the Debate of the Month invites to the campus of the University of Kentucky each month during the season, outstanding debate teams to give them experience and critique.

The Nicholas team was presented the winner's plaque. The plaque they will keep until January 19, when they return to the University of Kentucky to defend their title. At this time the Nicholas team will take the negative side of the question against Bowling Green high school.

Judy Mitchell and John Cavers are the "B" team debaters for Nicholas. In previous seasons, Dennis Smith records for evaluating purposes, debates between the two teams and David Wagner serves as time-keeper. Debating for the first time in February of this year, Taylor and Wesley lost to Menfee county boys. They had their second debate with Menfee county and won the third one over Menfee county. In the present season, the record is 11 won and two lost.

The team will enter the Day-Ton, Ohio, Dayton, Chamaine, Tournament January 8 and 9.
