

Child's Age Should Determine Type of Safe Toys To Buy

At this time of year, when gift-givers are plagued with the annual problem: "Which toys are best for which age?" According to authorities, primary consideration should be given to a child's age and to toys which are not dangerous for him to handle. This opinion also is expressed in the National Toy Industry Association's new pamphlet, "Safe Toys for Children." The pamphlet is available in the National Toy Industry Association, 1200 Broadway, New York 10019.

ONE TO TWO. A child one to two years old should have toys which are safe for his age. Toys which are safe for this age include stuffed animals, rattles, teething rings, push-toy toys, and even non-toxic caps of other household objects.

TWO TO THREE. These children are more experimental and toys that can be shared are desirable. A few are: building blocks, wooden animals and toy cars or trucks.
