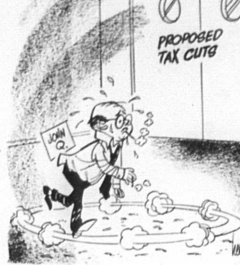

Increases Capital Stock

The stockholders of the Deposit Bank of Carlisle, Kentucky, at a Special meeting on September 12, 1962, voted to increase the Capital Stock of the bank from \$50,000.00 to \$100,000.00, by the declaration of a one hundred per cent stock dividend.

The \$50,000.00 needed for the increase was taken from the undivided profits account of the bank.

After the stock dividend doubled the shares of stock to 1000, the \$100.00 par value of each share was split two for one, with the par value set at \$50.00 per share.

For an example, a person who owned ten shares of stock in the bank before the stock dividend, now owns forty shares.
