Farm & Home

September 30 is the deadline for farmers to file for the federal gasoline tax refund. This gasoline use tax covers the period from July 1, 1961 through June 30, 1962 but farmers have until September 30 to file their final application. These forms are available in the Extension office for anyone who has not applied as yet.

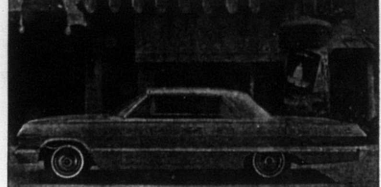
Fall is a good time to prepare plant beds. Many farmers have gone to the preparation for several reasons. The soil usually works better in the fall, weather conditions are a little better, after the tobacco has been hoisted they usually have a more spare time in the fall to prepare these beds than they do in the spring. Another thing, if they do not get around to preparing the beds in the fall, usually in the spring we have wet weather, dry weather or cold weather that sometimes makes it late before they can get around to preparing plant beds. So for that reason we find more and more farmers go-

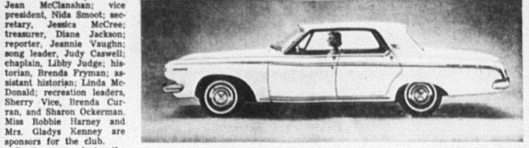

Even if your car's in good condition, it may act up occasionally. When puzzled, consult this chart. It doesn't cover every problem, but it will help with some of the more common ones.

DESCRIPTION	LIKELY CAUSE	WHAT TO DO
High-pitched squeal when you first start the engine.	1. Worn or glazed fan belt. 2. Loose fan belt. 3. Water pump seal needs lubrication.	1. Replace the belt if it looks worn. It could break. 2. Have the fan belt tension checked. A loose belt may not turn the generator fast enough to charge the battery. 3. Add Shell Cooling System Protector to radiator water.
Throbbing roar.	1. Damaged or worn muffler.	Replace muffler. Your Shell dealer can do this for you.
High-pitched erratic ping-pong sound—usually lasts just a few seconds. (Often called wild ping.)	1. Erratic combustion caused by glowing carbon deposits that flake off and ignite the fuel too soon. Exhaust fumes. Most noticeable when driving in town or when your engine is idling.	1. Broken fan belt. 2. Faulty generator or voltage regulator. Or loose connection in electrical system.	Stop at the first station to avoid running a battery down. 1. Replace fan belt. Suggest a carry spare belt—it could save you time and trouble. 2. Have electrical system inspected to locate the trouble.
When cruising, dashboard generator light goes on—or ammeter erratic continuously shows "discharge."	1. Broken fan belt. 2. Faulty generator or voltage regulator. Or loose connection in electrical system.	Stop at the first station to avoid running a battery down. 1. Replace fan belt. Suggest a carry spare belt—it could save you time and trouble. 2. Have electrical system inspected to locate the trouble.
Brake pedal action feels peculiar: 1. Pedal feels spongy. 2. Pedal slowly sinks to floor under pressure.	1. Air in brake lines. 2. Hydraulic fluid leaking past master cylinder piston.	Brakes with these troubles should be fixed immediately. Have your Shell dealer inspect your brake system.
Car pulls to either side: 1. When braking. 2. When cruising.	1. Water, oil or hydraulic fluid on brake lining/brakes out of adjustment. 2. Uneven or low pressure in tires.	1. Think back! If you've just driven through water, drive with caution until linings dry. Otherwise, have brakes checked soon—it could be dangerous. 2. Check tires for correct pressure. Do this soon. Under-inflation can also cause excessive tire wear.
Engine temperature suddenly passes the danger point on your dashboard gauge.	1. Broken fan belt. (You may hear the clatter when this breaks.) 2. Loss of cooling water.	Turn off engine. 1. Check fan belt. 2. To check coolant—follow these rules. Let engine cool down. Remove radiator cap slowly with extreme care to avoid scalding. Add water slowly with engine idling. Check for leaks.
