**Ploving Under Covers.**  
The farmer who plows under cover crops, if he plows under many roots as they will have later, and it is the most that furnish much of the organic matter of the cover crop. All cover crops should be plowed under before they are 18 inches high. When they are plowed under early, moisture is retained in the soil and it is easy to make a good seedbed. On the other hand, if the cover crop has made most of its growth and is approaching maturity, it is dry of cold and, consequently, it may be difficult to make a good seedbed. While the time of plowing will be determined by the weather, all cover crops should be turned under as soon as possible. Fertilizer, crop residues, and manure may be applied with the cover crop. There is little danger of making it too heavy as long as there is decaying organic matter in the soil. Fertilizer helps the cover crop, manure, and crop residue to decay quickly.
