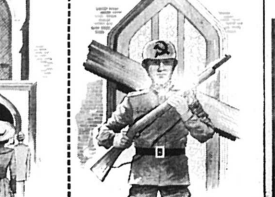

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## County Highway Improvements

In its first three calendar years through Dec. 31, 1962, the Combs Administration spent a total of \$664,797.20 in Nicholas County to build and maintain roads.

Nicholas County's allocation for rural secondary roads and rural highways for the 1962-1963 fiscal year is \$126,225.94. Distribution of this secondary road funds (2/7 of the 7-cent gasoline tax) is now determined by the Rural Secondary Formula, which was adopted by the Combs Administration in 1961 and then enacted into law by the 1962 General Assembly.

This impartial Formula guarantees every county a fair share of such funds. Nicholas County's 1962-63 allotment under this Formula is \$68,566.82. In addition, the State will spend \$27,859.12 this year in Nicholas County under the rural highways program.

Under the past administration, only \$112,684.13 was spent in Nicholas County for rural secondary roads and rural highways in fiscal year 1956-1957. Three other significant projects undertaken by the Combs Administration include resurfacing nine miles of the Carlisle-Owingsville Road KY 30 and bridge improvements on KY 13 and KY 32. Combination of these projects was well over \$100,000.

Major construction: Gallows Hill Road, Provides Dams for lakes in 4-H Club camp ground, 2,372 miles, \$297,891.97.

Blacktop Surfacing or Resurfacing: Carlisle-Owingsville Road, 9,202 miles, \$57,123.91.

Bridge Improvements: Paris-Jacksonville-Carlisle, Hinkston Creek approach and bridge at Bourbon County line, 0.179 miles, \$46,708.86; Carlisle-Flemingsburg, Painting Bridge over Licking River, \$2,189.00.

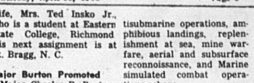
