Section 3. Penalties. Any person who violates any provision of this regulation shall be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each day the violation continues unless provided by KRS 212.900 (2).

Section 4. Partial Invalidation. Effect Of. If any word, clause, section or paragraph of this regulation shall be declared invalid, the invalidity of such word, clause, section or paragraph shall not affect the validity of any of the remaining provisions.

Section 5. Repeals. All regulations or parts or regulations of the NICHOLAS County Board of Health in conflict herewith are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.

Section 6. Effective Date. This regulation shall become effective thirty days after date of publication. 6-13-1963

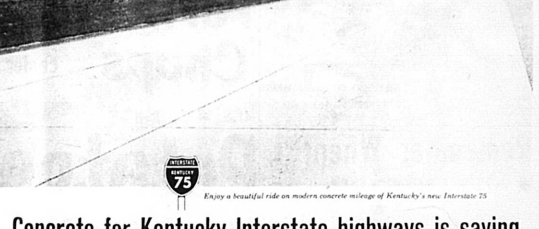

Concrete for Kentucky Interstate highways is saving millions of dollars in future expenditures
With all its advantages of long life and low maintenance cost, concrete costs no more to build than asphalt on Interstate highways. Construction costs for the two movements are equal, and every mile of Interstate highway, the Federal Government pays 90 percent of the construction cost, the State pays 10 percent. Kentucky, in selecting modern concrete pavement, is building a network of super-highways that is equal to any in the nation. The big savings come in upkeep. Once these highways are built, Kentucky will pay 100 percent of the cost of maintaining them. Performance studies on concrete highways prove concrete will need no significant upkeep for decades. These same studies show asphalt highways in Kentucky require not only continuing maintenance, but complete resurfacing 8 to 12 years after they are built. To resurface just one mile of Interstate highway with a two-inch layer of asphalt will cost about \$24,000. That is as much as Kentucky's 10 percent share of the cost of building it in the first place. With approximately 1,000 miles of Interstate highways and turnpikes to be completed in the next 10 years, the resurfacing dollars saved with concrete will be an important contribution to the modernization of the farm to market roads.
