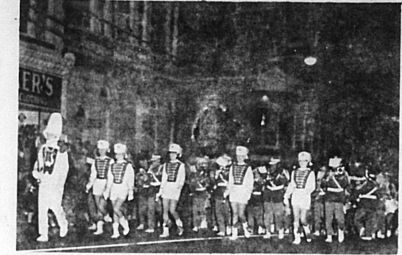

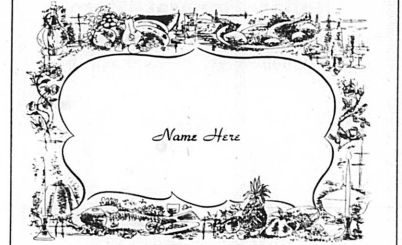

To finance the paper the
staff is going to sell ads
on the yearly basis. The
price of the school paper
will be increased to 15¢ in-
stead of 10¢ as in the past.
The Journalism class made

in the county.
