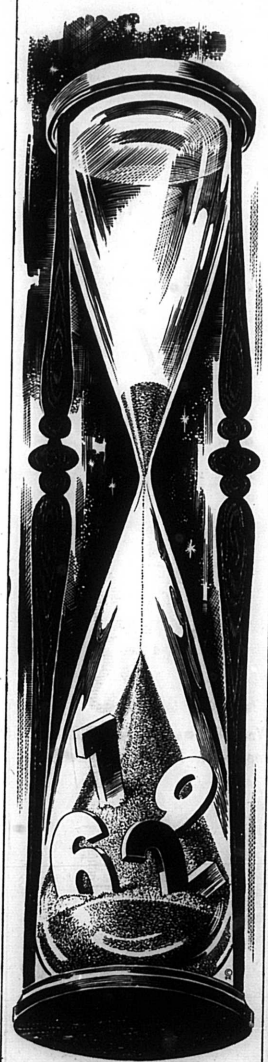

Jet Bombers On Missions Over State

Jet bombers of the Strategic Command will begin flying missions on the 1st of the year at the point this section of Kentucky against simulated targets near Hicksville, Ind.

Radar-bomb scoring equipment mounted on an Air Force train pointed near Hicksville will score the accuracy of simulated bomb drops by means of radio and radar signals.

B-47, B-52 and B-58 bombers, traveling along a 10-mile wide training corridor, will fly subsonically at altitudes of approximately 3,000 feet during the simulated bomb run.

The corridor will follow a generally northwest direction after starting north of Hazard, Ky. It will pass Pine Ridge, Flemingsburg, Cynthiana and Owensboro, Ky., and Madison, Napoleon, Columbus, Bedford and Paris, Ind., and then to the aiming point near Hicksville.

No bombs are carried by the SAC aircraft on these training missions. After the corridor and targets have been used for approximately 20 days, operations along the route will be suspended, because the crews become fa-
