

Boy Scout Council Meets

The regular Executive Board meeting of the 34 county Blue Grass Boy Scout Council, held Thursday night at Chef's Restaurant, had the characteristics of a "Victory Dinner." Council President C. R. McAlister had just received word that the Blue Grass Council had just won the Region IV yearly contest trophy for best percentage of growth for 1962. The local Council was second in 1961. The Region consists of 27 Scout Councils and covers the states of Ohio, West Virginia and Kentucky. The 1962 growth was 12 1/2% or 902 boys, bringing the total active boy membership to 8,220 Cubs, Scouts, and Explorers; a new high in membership for the 34 county Blue Grass Council.

In addition, it is anticipated that the Blue Grass Council will also be first in place in Region 4 in new unit growth with a gain of 190's in Troops, Parks and Explorers Units bringing the total number to 3700 Scout groups.

The Council led councils of similar type in the entire country in the Explorer Camping Program. The regular Boy Scout camping program is above the national average. The new McKee Scout Reservation is one of the finest Scout Camps in America.

Other phases of the 1962 program have been very good. 40% of the boy membership advanced in rank, over 50 boys earned the Forfe Award, 4,254 Merit Badges were awarded, the physical fitness program was improved, expressions were excellent, the leadership training program with its University of Scouting held at the University of Kentucky trained 979 Troop Leaders in March of 1962.

It was a good program year, but a good program ended the year with a sizeable operating deficit. Mr. McAlister named the Executive Board that the Council must secure better financial support or it will be forced to cut back on its professional staff, which Mr. McAlister pointed out is already one man short.



Know Your Potatoes!

Round Whites
Of the "Russet" type, this potato, with Kalamata the chief commercial variety, is heavily grown in Washington, United States. Harvested in the autumn, it stores well, its marketing area mostly in Eastern United States. Kalamata is recognized by its smooth, craggy but skin color, and to round shape, with shallow eyes. It is a top quality general purpose potato - makes and fries well, and is a leader.

Round Reds
Top producing variety is Red Pontiac, known by its dark red skin color, which is smooth to sometimes slightly reticulated. Eyes are medium deep and red.

Long Russets
This potato is a top type, with light brown, smooth skin and eyes, which have like to have a higher percentage of solids than any type of potato. The texture is so uniform and so well adapted to the conditions of an excellent tuber and variety is being produced only in Great Britain. The marketing area of this potato is mostly in the United States and Canada.

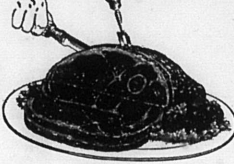

NEW TV SERIES FOR CORN FARMERS

An educational series of four Seminars on how to grow corn more efficiently has been announced by Geigy Agricultural Chemicals, sponsor of the program series. The seminars in separate weekly programs will cover the subjects of Minimum Tillage Farm Management; Soil and Weed Control; and many TV stations in our area beginning early in February.

The purpose of these shows is to bring the working experience of participants to progressive corn growers; and the latest information on growing corn more profitably in regard to equipment, practices and materials. It is believed that this is the first time that a sponsored series of discussion programs directed specifically to corn growers has been produced for television.

A different panel will participate for each of the four discussion topics. The panelists will include county managers and credit specialists and leading farmers representing different types of farming operations.

The first Seminar will be a thirty-minute television discussion of a topic of vital concern to every corn farmer - MINIMUM TILLAGE. This new practice can save equipment and fuel while improving soil tilth and increasing corn yields. The program will be presented on WKYT-TV channel 27, Sunday, Feb. 3, 6 to 8:30 p.m.

The television program will explore the theory, purpose and advantages of minimum tillage and the disadvantages of excessive tillage.
