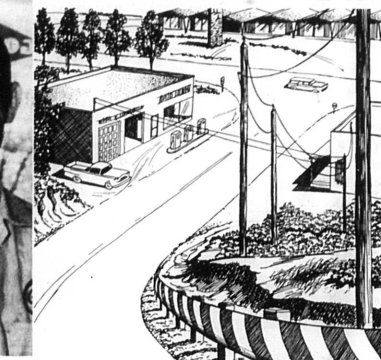

The wedding date has not been set.

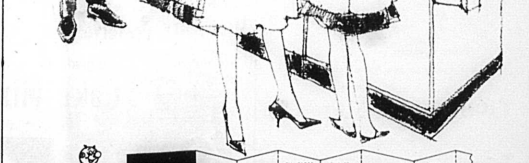
Gilley-Hatton
