Use of Seat Belts

Farm Bureau is launching a campaign to promote widespread use of seat belts by automobile drivers. This is one of the most important phases of state wide safety program now going on.

This special drive was put under way by the Farm Bureau Young People's Committee under the leadership of Early Perry, director of the committee at the state office. The campaign will begin June 1 and the belts will be handled on consignment by the county Farm Bureau office at cost. The cost will be \$4.33 per belt, including sales tax. No advance fee will be required.

The pushing of this special program during the next three months will afford a wonderful opportunity for the county Farm Bureau to do an important and much-needed service because each sale represents a possible opportunity to save a life or prevent serious injury to an operator of a motor vehicle.

Cornell University studies show that the frequency of serious injury to passengers in motor vehicles is much higher among those not using seat belts than it is among those using belts at the time of the accident. Of course, seat belts will not prevent accidents, but they will greatly lessen the danger of serious injury should an accident occur. The Cornell University scientists have stated that seat belts, if widely used by the motoring public could save at least 5,000 lives in our country each year merely by holding riders inside the car in case of an accident, not to mention the immense damage that otherwise

would be prevented by use of the seat belts. The scientists also say that every mile driven increases the chance of having a major accident, which is an important reason for wearing the seat belt drive at the beginning of the main vacation season when the maximum number of people will be making the longest trips of the year.

Indications are that this campaign will get wide support by the local Farm Bureau organizations and prove a great success. It is to be hoped this will come true because it will prove to be a life-saving and injury-preventing effort.

TELSTAR II the 176 lb. communications satellite recently launched from Cape Canaveral is now circling the earth in 221-minute orbits at speeds up to 19,500 miles an hour. Telstar II is carrying out many experiments during operation, but its special job is to discover ways to avoid or overcome the effects of radiation in space that temporarily crippled Telstar I. Like the first Telstar, this new satellite was launched by NASA, with the telephone company paying for the cost of launching and tracking.
