Miss Sarah Frances Broun has returned to Covington after a short vacation with her mother, Mrs. Eva Broun and baby, May.

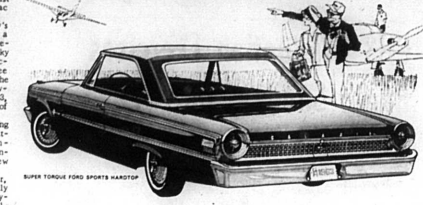
FOUNDRY OF YOUTH IN CLARK COUNTY

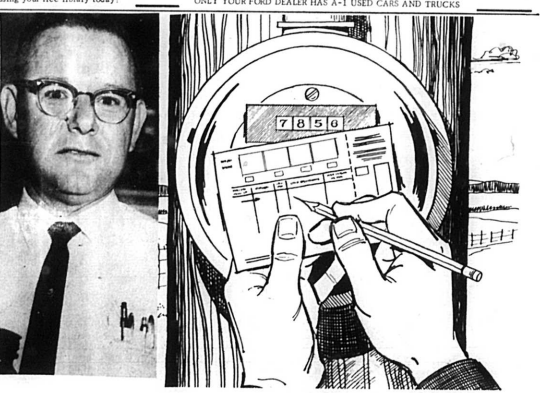
